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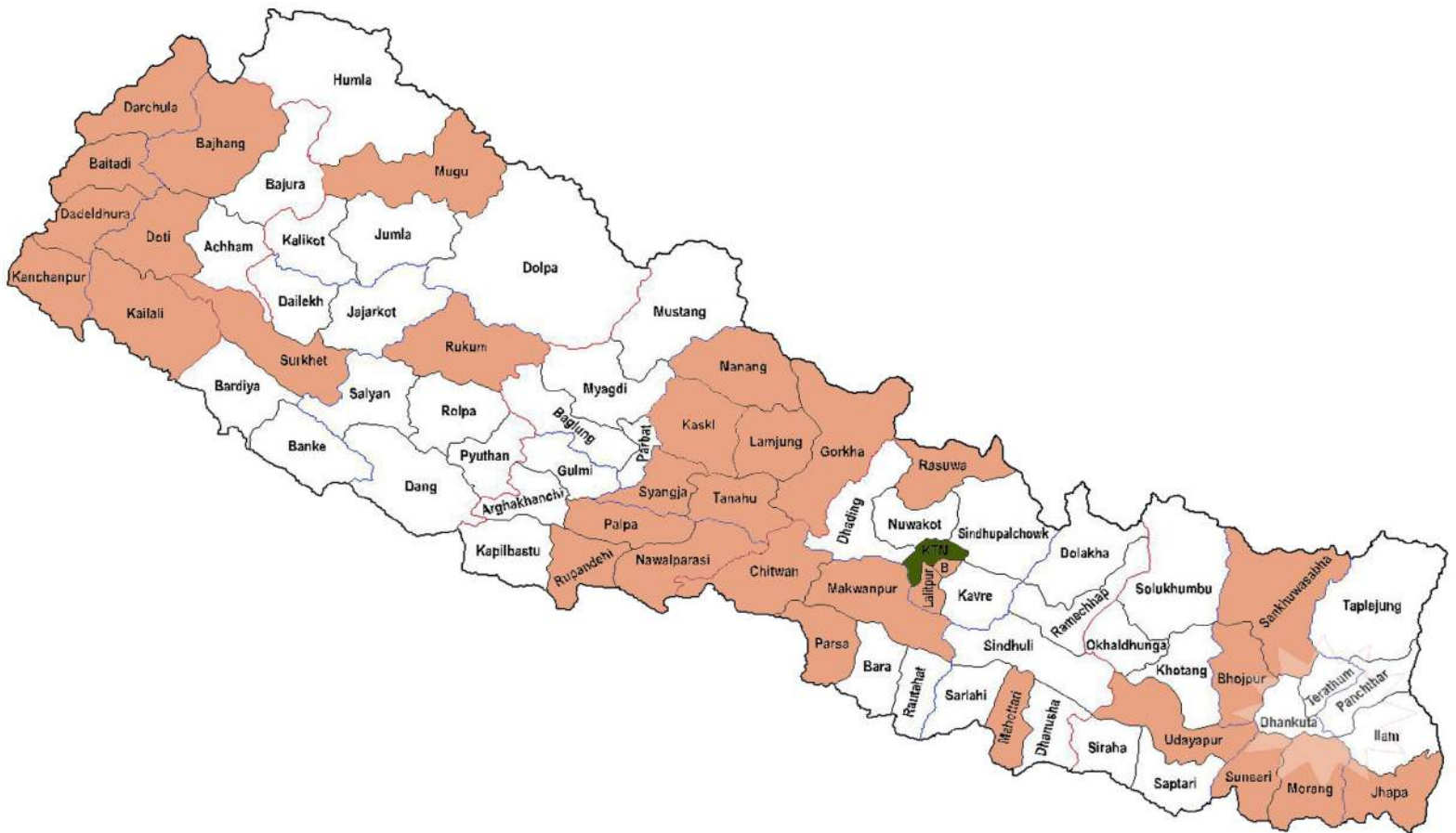

YOUTH FOR SCHOOL: SHE INITIATIVES



Marking the World Environment Day at 5th June, Nepalese youth for Climate Action (NYCA) with the support of Clean Energy Nepal (CEN) initiated a 15 days project "Youth for Schools: SHE Initiatives (for Sanitation, Hope and Environment)" as a part of UN Habitat Youth fund Project to promote Clean Environment, Sanitation hygiene, WASH activities and recreational activities for students of the Kathmandu based Schools which got hit and damaged by the Mega Earthquake of 2015, 25th April. Hundreds of School of Nepal was damaged fully and partially due to the earthquake and several thousand students got affected. As a result of which students are forced to study under the tarpaulins and tents and are deprived of many basic facilities one of which is toilet facilities. So taking this into consideration, Durbar High School, Ranipokhari and Ratna Rajya School, Mid Baneshwor School were selected for temporary toilet construction along with the promotion of hygiene and WASH activities. Besides, Recreational activities like playing team games, dancing, singing, sketching were done to help students get relieved from the post-earthquake stress. In this two week long project, every activity including toilet construction had had the active participation of the students of the respective school along with the organizing team and technicians.

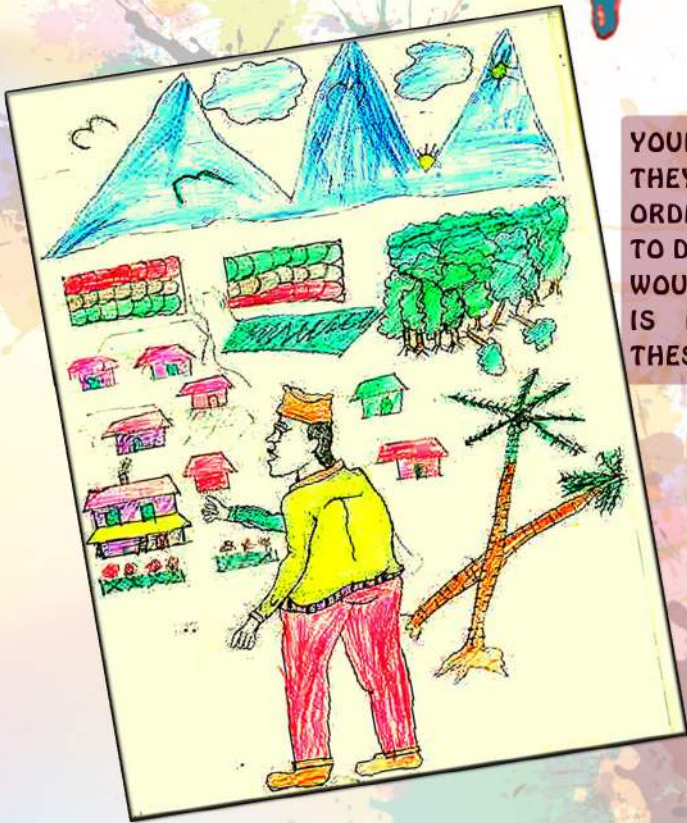

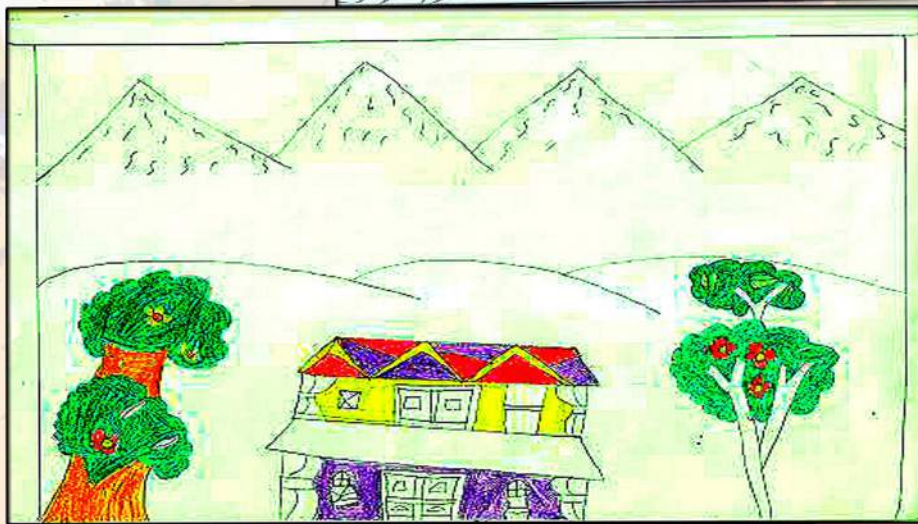

COP21: Expectation and Youth Role

Climate change impacts are increasing around the world. Many countries are facing unprecedented flooding, drought, heat waves, glacier melting and water scarcity putting their communities at great risk. Small, poor and capacity constrained countries are the ones suffering the most from the impacts of climate change. This is the consequence of growing carbon emission in the atmosphere that is resulting in the increase of world's average temperature. Nepal is one the most vulnerable countries to the negative impact.

In order to tackle this grave problem of climate change, collective international effort is urgently needed. World's 195 countries will come together in Paris, France from 30 November to 11 December 2015 to decide on a new climate treaty. This meeting is the 21st session of the Conference of Parties (COP) of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC). It is utmost important that this COP is successful in producing a treaty that will address climate change. The UNFCCC failed to produce an international climate treaty at the Copenhagen Summit held in 2009, Denmark and this time around the same cannot be repeated.

There is a huge expectation from COP21 that it will deliver equitable and legally binding international treaty that is acceptable to all the countries. The COP will need to agree on a high carbon reduction target to put the world on a safer path. As the carbon emission is rising, climate impacts are also increasing, which is here to stafor a long time. The rich and bigger carbon emitting countries will have to make a lot of effort in containing the world temperature rise below 2 degrees Celsius from the pre industrial level. Similarly, the rich and economically powerful countries will also have to agree to provide assistance to climate vulnerable, poor and small counties like Nepal. This must be in the form of adequate financial assistance, technological transfer and capacity building. Without this assistance being a part of the COP21 agreement package, it will be impossible for vulnerable countries like Nepal to adapt and tackle climate change.

OP21 is unlikely to be successful or ambitious on its own without the pressure from around the world, especially from the youths. Climate change is not a short-term phenomenon; hence youths will have to strongly advocate the issue of inter-generational equity before and during the COP. There is a famous saying that "We do not inherit the earth from our ancestors; we borrow it from our children", which is very relevant for the decision outcome in Paris. Youths should intensely avcate this principle and make the adult decision makers morally responsible for future generations. Youths should be a part of the decisions making process in Paris.

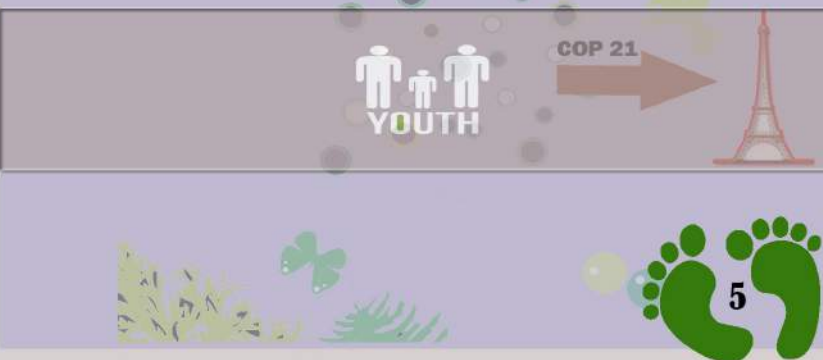

This New Year, Nepalese Youth for Climate Action (NYCA), in collaboration with Clean Energy Nepal (CEN) organized a fun cum learning event titled "NYCA Treasure Hunt" at Mangal bazaar, Patan on 1st of Baisakh, 2072.

The theme of this initiative was 'Youth, Culture and Environment' with the main objective of spreading awareness to people regarding the plastic use minimization. 13 teams each comprising of 4 members participated in the event where the teams completed a series of 10 unique tasks. The task included a whole lot of things like plantation, counting flower pots & mane, group selfie, water taps cleaning and so on by wandering the places nearby the durbar square; the golden temple, the alko hiti, the banglamukhi, chyasal and the thousand Buddha temples. The teams were also guided to collect the plastics found during their tasks. Majority of the participating teams were students from various colleges of Kathmandu valley.



Based on time efficiency and accuracy of the task, top ten teams were announced including one winner team. This event was broadly successful in sensitizing youths about environmental issues and mobilizing them as an agent for spreading awareness among local community. "Jaagau Yuwa, Sampadaa Jogaau, Batawaran Bachau" was the theme for the event.

With an aim to express our deep love and concerns to our beloved nature, NYCA organized an open love letter competition and couples run. The main motive of this event was sensitizing youths about their responsibility towards the environment. The enthusiastic participation of youths in the event made it vibrant and successful. NYCA received more than 50 letters that expressed love for nature. Among them top 10 letters were recited in the main event and top three were selected in the program by the Judges. At the mean time couple run was also organized with theme of developing mutual coordination and understanding among the partners. There were altogether 20 couples participating in the event. The top three winners of both competitions were awarded with medals and certificates by the honorable judges.

Mr. Manjeet Dhakal a founder members of NYCA. He has been following and participating in the UN Climate Change negotiations since 2009, as a member of the national delegation of Nepal. He is a member of Core Negotiating Team for UN Climate Change Negotiation for the Government of Nepal and is associated with Climate Analytics as LDC Senior Climate Policy Analyst. He is a member of the Executive Board of Clean Energy Nepal and is also associated with Khowpa College, Bhaktapur and Amrit Science College, Kathmandu as Faculty for climate change and environmental governance.

1. How did the idea of establishing a youth group emerged? What things played an instrumental role in establishing NYCA?

A worldwide momentum on climate action was growing more prominently after Bali climate change conference in 2007 for a global agreement to be agreed on Copenhagen Climate summit in 2009. Nepal and specially the youth groups cannot remain untouched with this global discourse. At the national level we already had begun collaborations with youth groups and outreached to schools and colleges to raise awareness and findings solutions. So the foundation of the youth network on climate change at national level was put in place at the beginning of 2008, later the network got formalized on August of the same year on the occasion of World Youth Day.

2. From the team of four, NYCA has grown up more and has reached to different parts of Nepal. What do you think has played a prime role in outreaching of NYCA?

Before the Copenhagen Climate Change Conference, the issue of climate change was not very familiar everyone. On those initial days, we faced dual challenges; first to inform general public about this issue; and second to prepare them to share their stories and ask; to put pressure to the leaders from national and international level to take urgent action. Regardless of our limited resources and capacity, a large group of young friends from all over the country shown interest to our work and were ready to stand together to take the message on this important issue throughout the country. I believe that the urgency of the issue and motivation of young friends helped us in outreaching.

3. How do you evaluate the role of NYCA in climate change movement in Nepal? How do you see the work of NYCA at present? Are they relevant enough in raising the issue of climate change among youth?

Context has changed now. In early days we invested a lot in bringing together motivated young friends to serve as an ambassador in spreading message to build public awareness on this important issue. Nowadays, climate change is also included in the curriculum of school and universities. The large number of our motivated young friends who have worked with us in past are now delicately working on this issue at national and international level; some of them are leading organizations as well. This gives us satisfaction to see the outcomes of the effort that were put together few years ago.

I have observed NYCA's shifting priorities according to needs. To my knowledge, in recent days, NYCA has engaged more on policy advocacy which is very relevant in the current context. However, it's equally important to balance the network priorities to address the evolving needs. I believe, NYCA will continuously remain in the heart of young friends those who care for climate.

4. In your opinion, what specific achievement that NYCA has reaped so far? How can youth play a constructive role in addressing climate change globally as well as nationally?

As I just mentioned above, it is very important to address the evolving needs. Moving from public awareness to policy advocacy, I believe that the young friends should also contribute more effectively on knowledge generation. Continuous engagement of young people on building scientific information and evidences will certainly help to move forward.

5. How optimistic are you about the global climate change negotiation process? Will it yield something that the vulnerable country like Nepal is expecting and demanding for so long?

Climate change is a global problem, and it needs global commitment for its solution. There is no other better option to deal with this issue other than the multilateral process -the United Nations. It is widely accepted that the progress towards achieving a new agreement is very slow and the deadline is approaching. But the recent gathering of key actors around the world, and the engagement of world leaders from politics, religious and many other field has shown positive signals for Paris agreement. More recently, the announcement and submission of key countries contributions for the new agreement has shared optimism for future climate deal.



18TH SAARC YOUTH DEMANDS ACTION



The 18th SAARC Summit

On the occasion of 18th SAARC Summit held in Kathmandu, NYCA organized an event: "18th SAARC Summit: Youth Demands Action" on 18th November at Basantapur Durbar Square, Kathmandu with the objectives to urge SAARC leaders to revisit SAARC's past declarations on Climate change and to ensure the implementation of past agreements made by SAARC on attaining food security, tackling climate change and mitigating disasters in region.

More than 30 youths performed a flash mob in Basantapur Durbar Square followed by a very informative drama and candle lightening. About 25 minutes drama theme was centralized on the Climate Change issues faced by people of South Asia and climax of the story reflected better South Asia after the implementation of all those declaration that the SAARC leaders have made. In the midst of the drama, Candle lightning ceremony was done in the memory of South Asian people who lost their life due to Climate Change induced Disaster and food insecurity. The candle lightening was designed in the shape of SAARC's map.

"With 25 million more children under 5 at the risk of malnutrition by 2050 because of climate change , action to cut emission and support communities to adopt is crucial. .

By the 2050 , we can assume that the majority of the world population would be facing the problem of hunger and malnutrition. This a serious problem which afflict million of human being. That is why Food and nutrition security is major global challenge in the world. And it is clear that climate change is one of the reason behind increasing global hunger index and decreasing nutritional value of the food we have been consuming.

So it's time to think , what and how are we going to feed our future generation. And if we want to make our future generation secured on food and nutrition security we have to control climate change. And controlling the climate change is not a big issue as we general people think. We just need to make a commitment and initiate it from the individual level. 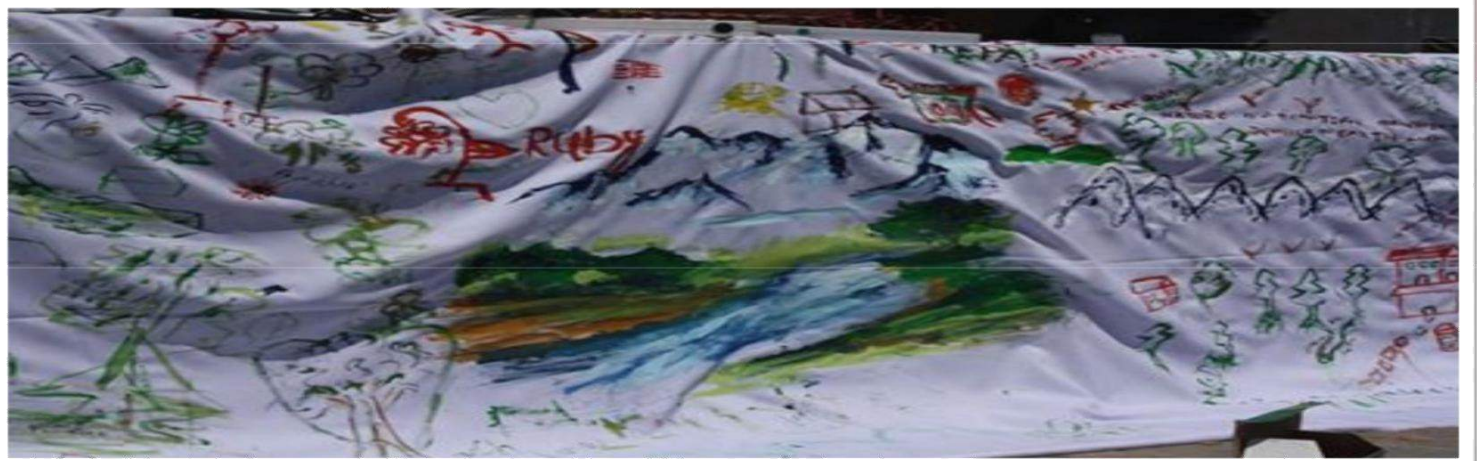
